Washington, Aug. 27.—(A)—The social security board was reported authoritative quarters today to have given up its plans to grant aid to states this year for old age pensions and other parts of the social security program.

This word preceded a White House conference at which President Roosevelt and congressional leaders arranged to canvass how the board could be financed until January.

**Left Without Funds.**  
Loss of the deficiency bill before the filibuster by Senator Long, democrat, Alabama, last night left it without funds.

Arthur Altmeyer, the only member of the board in Washington, today also was to see the president.

**Study Use of Other Money.**  
Attorney General Cummings was studying whether it would be legal to use some of the \$4,000,000,000 relief and temporarily to fill gaps left by failure of the appropriation.

If it is found relief funds are not available, the board may start work on labor and commerce department funds, with employees going on the payrolls of those departments.

**Filibuster Ends Session.**  
Turbulent and tense to the very last instant of its strife-torn first session, the 74th congress headed homeward today, leaving anxious Roosevelt leaders seeking ways to obtain millions of funds cut off by a 5½ hour filibuster by Senator Long, Democrat of Louisiana.

Talking on despite taunts, gibes and earnest pleas, Long held the senate floor until the senate adjourned at the stroke of midnight last night, and thus succeeded in blocking the \$102,000,000 third deficiency bill, carrying funds to start the new deal's giant social security program, utilities regulation, Cuffey coal control bill, the new neutrality plan and other major measures.

**Kingfish Refuses to Yield.**  
Declaring he wanted action on 12 cotton and 90 cent wheat loan amendments which were abandoned when the AAA announced a compromise 10 cent loan plus subsidy program

at the congress session last night, and talked the "New Deal" out of about \$103,000,000 when the deficiency appropriation bill, including the boost in cotton and wheat loan rates, had to be abandoned.

## Boy Hitchhiker Falls Under a Truck, Killed

### Byron Bisbee, 15, Dies of Injuries in Hospital Here.

Byron Bisbee, 15, who gave his address as 324 Topeka boulevard, Topeka, Kan., died at St. Charles hospital at noon today from injuries received early this morning, presumably when he fell under the wheels of a truck trailer on which he was "hitching a ride."

Lying on the pavement a block west of the Burlington railroad elevation in route 34 and two miles northwest of Naperville, the boy was found shortly before 5 o'clock this morning by State Highway Patrolman Frank Long and was taken to St. Charles hospital in the O. J. Beidelman ambulance. Following his death, the body was removed to the Daleiden funeral chapel where an inquest will be held tomorrow morning.

Altho complete details have not been learned, it was understood that young Bisbee "hitched" a ride on a large truck and trailer combination riding between the truck and trailer. Losing his grip, he fell beneath the wheels of the trailer which passed over him. The driver of the truck, unaware of his passenger, did not stop. The name of the truck driver is not known.

According to statements made by the youth at the hospital, his father, O. W. Bisbee, is on relief.

## Boy Killed By Truck, Hungry For Two Days

### Pitiful Tale Told By 15 Year Old Youngster Before Death.

A pitiful tale of hunger and privation was told by Byron Bisbee, 15, before his death at St. Charles hospital yesterday from injuries received when he fell beneath the wheels of a truck trail in route 34, two miles west of Naperville. It was revealed today by State Highway Patrolman Frank Long, of Lisle, at the inquiry which was held today at the Daleiden funeral chapel by Coroner Herman J. Vierke, of Elgin.

Long testified that he had found the youth, who gave his address as 323 Topeka boulevard, Topeka, Kan., lying on the shoulder of the state highway, critically injured. He informed the officer that he "hitched" a ride on a truck-trailer combination, hanging on behind the cab of the truck and finally, weakened by hunger, losing his grip and falling under the wheels of the trailer.

It was 3 o'clock when the officer found him and the boy, unable to move, had been drenched by a heavy rain which had fallen shortly before. He was ravenously hungry, not having eaten for two days. He was taken in an ambulance of the O. J. Beldelman funeral parlors, Naperville, to St. Charles hospital where he died shortly before noon yesterday.

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Ekstrom was released from jail July 15 in August, and immediately set out celebrating his new found freedom. It wasn't long before he found himself in the custody of Ralph Key, chief deputy sheriff, who was bringing him back to Sheriff Larson's road and rooming establishment stuffed from the outside by the bars in the windows.

The prisoner showed his resentment having to look thru several vertical bars rather than over one which is horizontal by seriously setting out to do all the damage that he could in the barred room. He first jammed the drain in the wash basin in his cell and then turned the water faucet wide open, flooding the south end of the jail and soaking 75 cots and mattresses stored on the floor.

He then tore all of the light fixtures out of the wall and threw his head at the light in the next cell. He smashed up his masterpiece in jail
