a board tomorrow to study the  
possibility of creating a new  
agency which would pro-  
vide relief projects in  
areas which have the  
largest populations.

Elsewhere it was dis-  
cussed how relief projects are  
being carried out by  
President Roosevelt and  
members of his cabinet  
through various  
governmental agencies  
and how they are  
planning to carry them out to  
relieve the suffering  
caused by the  
construction by states and  
cities.
