

## Belgium's Spaak Dies At Age 73

BRUSSELS (AP) — Paul Henri Spaak, Belgian Socialist leader and one of the architects of European unity and the North Atlantic Treaty Organization, died early today at the age of 73. It was officially announced.

Death was attributed to a kidney deficiency.

Spaak was known as "Mr. Europe" for his work for European unity and also played a leading part at the founding meeting of the United Nations in San Francisco in 1945. He became the first president of the U.N. General Assembly in 1946 and in 1970 came out of retirement to attend the 25th anniversary meeting of the world organization in New York.

# \* 2 Aurorans McGovern Under Die in Crash 'Intense Pressure'

An Aurora father and his 11-year-old daughter were killed and five others were injured in an auto crash Saturday night near Lockport.

Dead are Robert Guethhoff, 37, and his daughter, Kimberly, of 1411 Westwood Drive.

Listed in very critical condition was Guethhoff's wife, Judy.

Also treated for injuries were Dennis Peterson, 18, of Joliet, Donna Eddy, 16, of Aurora, and three other Guethhoff children, Robert, Jr., 10, Tracy, 7, and Scott, 4.

According to Will County Sheriff's deputies who investigated the one-car accident, eight persons were in the car. The car, they said, went out of control, left the road for some 180 feet, sheared off a mailbox, crossed the road, hit an abutment, rolled on its side and crashed broadside into a tree.

The accident occurred at about 7:30 p.m. at Weber and Airport roads west of Lockport.

The injured were taken to St. Joseph Hospital in Joliet, where officials refused to release further information about the condition of the other injured at presstime early this morning.

ABERDEEN, S.D. (UPI)— Sen. George McGovern said Saturday he has been under "intense pressure" to dump Sen. Thomas F. Eagleton from the Democratic ticket. But he said no decision on the "difficult question" will be announced until after he meets face to face with Eagleton Monday.

"I do not know how it will all come out," he said.

McGovern left the Black Hills after a two-week working vacation and stopped at Mitchell, S.D., where he grew up, and Aberdeen, S.D. to address the South Dakota Democratic state convention on his way back to Washington.

He acknowledged he faces an uphill fight to oust President Nixon from the White House but predicted victory.

The last week of his stay in his native state was overshadowed by mounting pressure for him to insist Eagleton resign from the ticket after the Missouri senator revealed Tuesday he had been hospitalized three times from 1960 to 1966 for treatment of exhaustion and depression.
